Looking Back, Looking Forward

was looking back over fortysome years, sorting through records, letters, photos; and pausing frequently to reflect on memories. They were good years, every one. Not everything went well, of course. A couple of challenges turned out to be a foot taller than expected; and I found myself wishing for more wisdom, talent and time to make things right. Most of the memories, however, remain rich and satisfying.

While packing books away, I came to one my mother had found at MacMillan's Book Store (E. State Street, Salem, Ohio, Est. 1850). Mom was careful with spending; but the title, "Lincoln's Devotional," caught her interest. This, she told the clerk, was to be a special gift for her son who was going off to the seminary.

The book is a reproduction of a tiny devotional published by The Religious Tract Society, London, 1852; and officially titled "The

Believer's Daily Treasure." Folks from Salem would find it hard to believe that MacMillan's would not have a first edition; but, in fact, the only original known to exist belonged to Abraham Lincoln. On occasion, those close to Lincoln would observe him reading from this little "pocket testament."

The Believer's Daily Treasure features a passage of scripture for every day of the year, followed by a reflective verse of prose. I like to look at the day before me, but sometimes wander to passages assigned to other days—often finding there a word of direction, encouragement or truth. Words found yesterday were especially meaningful:

Thou shalt remember all the way which the Lord thy God led thee these forty years...

To humble thee, and to prove thee, to know what was in thine heart, Whether thou wouldst keep his commandments. Deut. Viii. 2

Thus far the Lord has led me on, And made his truth and mercy known;

And while I tread this desert land, New mercies shall new songs demand.

Go with me here for just a bit; for we have traveled together. We have experienced excitement, enthusiasm, discovery, joys and sorrows. Tested by events, we have spent time being lost, humbled and hopeful. Together we have felt the hand of God leading us to truth. And together, we look forward to new mercies and new songs.



Following an extensive search process, which began in November of 2016, the Board of Directors of Lutheran Ministries of Mercy (LMM) has selected its next



President. At a special meeting held on April 3, 2017, the LMM Board unanimously supported the recommendation of its Executive Committee, naming Terri Rodriguez to succeed Pastor Don Wukotich as President and Chief Executive Officer of Lutheran Ministries of Mercy. Terri assumed these duties, effective May 1st, 2017.

Terri has served Luther Home of Mercy in various leadership roles for more than two decades—most recently as Vice President, responsible for overall management of the entire LHM program. Embracing Luther Home's core values, she has consistently advocated for the rights of individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities, participating in local, state and national consortiums.

Terri received her graduate degree in Public Administration from the University of Toledo. A Licensed Nursing Home Administrator, Terri also holds undergraduate degrees in human services, law enforcement and social work

An Ohio native, Terri resides in Sylvania, Ohio with her husband, Arnulfo and daughter, Maria.

Maybe You Forgot...

However large or small, every act of kindness is important.

A small act of kindness...something ordinary and common...something that might have happened only once and long ago could make such a difference to another person. In Matthew's Gospel, faithful servants of God were astounded to discover that anyone had noticed; for they could not even remember their acts of kindness ("When, Lord, did we do these things?").

A larger, more comprehensive act of kindness... something uncommon and out of the ordinary ...something which might have seemed almost too big – too involved, costly, frightening or troublesome – could be the only hope for someone in critical need. In Luke's Gospel, Jesus tells of an act of kindness provided to a certain man who was met by thieves on the road between Jerusalem and Jericho. It was a well traveled road, but no one stopped to help until a Samaritan traveler was moved with compassion. He went to the injured man, dressed his wounds, transported him to an inn, arranged for room, board and continuing care. To Jesus, the Samaritan traveler was a good neighbor.

Today's good neighbors emulate the example provided by the Good Samaritan: by responding courageously when others turn away; by providing

In March of 2012 Governor John Kasich signed an executive order authorizing the Employment First initiative in the state of Ohio. In doing so, Ohio joined several other states in supporting a shift within the developmental disabilities community; a shift to a culture that recognizes and embraces the contributions of people with developmental disabilities in the workplace.

Since that time, Ohio has worked to foster increased employment opportunities of all types for adults with developmental disabilities with the belief that every person should have the opportunity to pursue employment in the form they choose. State budget initiatives have supported employment transformation through carefully crafted employment supports and services.

At Luther Home we work to assist those we serve to fully utilize their strengths and talents when seeking jobs that match their skills. For some people, this may mean fully integrated competitive employment. Jay and Carolyn both work in the community and each works in a restaurant setting. For Jay, a long-term employee, his work enables him to more fully participate in his community where he knows and interacts with scores of friends and neighbors. Carolyn is working toward greater economic freedom and while she might tell you this isn't her dream job, she will also tell you she is no longer afraid to apply for work or interact with co-workers. Carolyn's next goal....dream job!

Other clients find meaningful employment in work enclaves such as landscaping, cleaning crews and vending machine sales. These mobile crews are supervised by an LHM staff member as they travel to area businesses to complete their work. Here they are valued for their high quality and efficient work while earning competitive wages.

Many residents and clients take advantage of the more traditional "sheltered employment" opportunities at Riverview Industries, LHM day programs, and Northwest day program. These center-based activities, such as arts and craft sales, packaging, and light assembly jobs enable participants to take pride in their efforts and resulting paychecks. Their work is important and appreciated and is a key to increased feelings of selfworth.


